


I know that no one will ever feel the way I do or care the way I do. It doesn't mean that I'm better or worse for that. I wish I could look at all of you now and you would value my opinion but maybe not. I also wish I could tell you how much people are relying on the work we are doing, hoping and praying it's gonna save their life. Research has saved my life.....twice, and odds are I won't be so lucky the third or fourth time. I wish I could say I wasn't envious or downright pissed that I drew the short straw in this life. I've been in failed drug trial after trial and watched 10+ years of work to see their drug fail, to watch your hair fall out or cause more fainting or muscle weakness so bad you fall to your knees when you step out of bed.

I wish I could tell you all what it was like when we first started running a lot of neuro studies, including the infamous hounds. These are the kind of studies that change you. I remember laying on those recovery beds with them and laying in their cages the next day. I sometimes wish I could make you see why I feel the way I do. That seeing those animals immediately takes you back and you remember every second of pain you felt for 7 days in the ICU. The nurses pushing me away from my husband when all of a sudden you are crying because you pray to god that's not the end, nurses whispering to you the next day saying I'm so glad you made it I was so worried about you. Or when you are in so much pain you can't physically open your eyes but you can hear your husband arguing with the nurses that I need more pain meds.

I wish you knew that all I can see in those moments is my 6 year old son laying on that cage floor, and I would rather cut off a limb than watch him go through that surgery. My 6 year old who was diagnosed with my disease this year. All while they tell me I likely won't make it to see my kids graduate high school. I have Arnold Chiari Malformation and Vascular Elhers Danlos Syndrome, both of which are incurable diseases. The average life expectancy is 45-48, with a major catastrophic health event occurring before age 40.

I just wish I could make you feel that. And maybe you do, and maybe it's just a job, and neither is wrong. But I hope you understand the importance of what you do and the impact it has.

Abstract

At the surrender of Singapore on 15 February 1942, over 100,000 men became prisoners of the Japanese. This included many medical officers who, over the ensuing years, treated men (and some women) suffering the ravaging effects of disease, worsened by the inhumane conditions of captivity. Many medical officers stand out for their work. One in particular, Jacob Markowitz, developed a blood transfusion service, under the most extreme conditions, for the sick working as slave labour on the Burma Railway. Although he qualified 20 years before the outbreak of war, little has been written of Markowitz's early life, or of the impact of this on his wartime contributions.




ASR 2020 Meeting September 16-18 La Jolla, California
